All age talk

It's amazing to think of Jesus riding into the city to the cheers and praise of so many people.

Finally, they recognised him as the Messiah, the one God would send to save everyone, and who they had been waiting for, for hundreds of years. It is strange though that such an important person, in fact, THE most important person would come riding on a donkey. Important people would usually have a very impressive big horse, or maybe a chariot. But not Jesus. Even though Jesus is the Son of God, he never showed off. He never tried to be a celebrity. He always pointed people to God the Father. In the Old Testament Zechariah prophesied that the Messiah would come, riding on a donkey. A prophesy is when God gives a message about the future to someone, to tell other people. It helps us to believe that Jesus really is the Messiah.

At the end of the story that Abigail read for us, it says that Jesus went to the temple once he had arrived in Jerusalem. The temple was their church. But because it was already getting late he went with his disciples, his closest friends, to Bethany. Bethany was a village about 2 miles from Jerusalem, and that's where Mary, Martha and Lazarus lived. It is thought that Jesus stayed with his good friends. He wouldn't have had much money, and even if he did, I don't think he would have chosen to stay in a posh hotel.

It's just a small detail in the story, but I love it because it shows how important his friends were to Jesus.

Jesus is all about relationships, not fame. People are so important to him. Just as Jesus loved staying with his friends, he also loves staying with us. He is so happy to be our friend; and when we welcome him, like the people in Jerusalem welcomed him, he will live within us, and never leave us.

You could try to recreate that Bible story in your home. You could act it out or use toys. If you act it out, choose someone strong to be the donkey!

We are now going to lead you through some prayers. We are going to use our hands to help us. If you like you can draw around your hand on a piece of paper. We used green, like palms. We like things neat, all tied up, making sense. There are so many times in the Bible when we don't have that luxury!

There are many contrasts, and they can be challenging to understand, they require faith and trust in God.

We are currently being forced into living in a world of contrasts. Where we are being told to stay safely inside, but many still need to brave the outside world in order to keep the country running, and people cared for.

Where many are still working, but at home – in their sanctuaries, their space usually reserved for family and friends, for leisure and for rest. Where some are far more connected to friends and family than they ever have been because they feel the pull to gather together, even whilst apart, and get through it. The time I have spent in touch with my family through messages and video calls has increased dramatically. While we do stay in touch, it's never been this much! And it has been a blessing. I know that won't be the case for everyone though, so let's make sure we are staying in touch with our less connected friends, family, church family and neighbours. While we are apart, we can be together in new ways.

Some of us are swapping our roles on a daily basis from parent to teacher and back again. And indeed, child to student and back. It takes quite some adjustment; I can tell you!

Contrasts can be grating on us, uncomfortable, unsettling and challenging. They can invite us to think and pray, to ask God to reveal to us their meaning and any actions we should take. Contrasts can cause us to solve problems, to change things for the better. We find contrasts in the Palm Sunday story.

Jesus is on a very significant journey, it's the start of Easter week (as we now know it) and he is riding into Jerusalem, fulfilling the prophesy in Zechariah, and yet he isn't going very far, just a couple of miles from the downtrodden village of Bethany. He would have done the journey before, and after. And yet this time it is completely different.

Zechariah describes Jesus as righteous and victorious, and the crowd recognise him as Messiah, Saviour, as they shout 'hosanna', meaning please save. Any yet he does not look victorious at all. He is on a borrowed donkey, he comes in meekly, humbly; as we heard on the video, humble in the Hebrew meaning poor or afflicted.

Jesus, the King, the Messiah arrives into Jerusalem with a welcome for royalty. People are cheering and shouting, laying down their cloaks and laying down palm branches that they would have cut from nearby fields, as was the custom. And yet he isn't on the regal powerful, impressive white horse. Just a meek, poor donkey.

And yet these contrasts also perfectly reflect Jesus character while on earth. You might remember the words from Philippians 2 vs 6-8 '(Jesus) who, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be used to his own advantage; rather, he made himself nothing by taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness. And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to death – even death on a cross!'

It might have even seemed strange to see this Jesus, who had very little and told people to sell their possessions and give to the poor, riding in with wealth and pomp.

You could also look to The Beatitudes in Matthew chapter 5 for a wonderful list of contrasts. The meek inherit the earth, those who mourn will find comfort, blessed are the persecuted because they will have a great reward in heaven one day. Perhaps later today you could read through them and ask God to speak to you through them.

Perhaps this week, as we lead up to Good Friday and Easter Sunday you could think about the contrasts that you are living with now and ask God

to speak to you about those, to show you the blessings for now and those to come in the future.

You could also think about the contrasts Jesus would have experienced as he went through Easter week, read through the Easter story and seek them out. Amen
